CHILDREN FIRST SUPPORT LINE IS HERE TO HELP

In June we revealed that a staggering 85% of parents in Scotland feel they have nowhere to turn when bringing up children becomes tough.

Every day our support line team hears from parents and carers across Scotland that raising their babies, children and teenagers is harder than ever.

We are encouraging parents and carers to get in touch with Children First's free support line and webchat service which provides emotional, practical and financial help for families.

At Children First we understand that all stages of growing up bring their own unique challenges. From worries about baby milestones and toddler tantrums to concerns about social media, bullying, exam stress or mental health we are here for parents and carers, whatever their concern about their child.



Tony\*, who is in his 50s, became a kinship carer for his granddaughter Cara after she was born, because her mum has serious mental health issues that prevent her from being able to care for her.

Cara is now two years old. Tony had been struggling to make ends meet and give Cara everything she needed because he was not getting the benefits he was entitled to.

Tony had tried applying for child benefit four times but had not been successful owing to an administrative error.

Louise, one of Children First's support line financial wellbeing experts was able to help Tony get his benefits sorted and the payments backdated.

Tony also had debts he was paying off. He had been advised he owed HMRC tax credits and had been paying these back through his universal credit.

Louise looked into it and on discovering Tony had gone bankrupt in 2016 realised that this debt should have been written off. Tony tried to get this corrected without any success. Thanks to help from Louise, the debt has now been written off and the payments Tony made have been refunded.

Tony said: "If it had not been for Louise making sense of the issues I don't know where I'd be now. She has helped me so much and I feel without Children First support line's help I would still be fighting for what was due to my granddaughter.

"It was only when Louise got involved that things started to get better. I feel like a massive weight has been lifted off my shoulders, it's such a relief.

"I can now focus on quality time with Cara who is such a joy, without the money worries I had before. I don't need to worry about struggling to buy the essentials that Cara needs and paying the bills anymore."

Children First is now providing the National Kinship Care Advice Service for Scotland. Any kinship carer who needs support can call Children First to access individual support for children and young people, family support, group-based peer support and financial wellbeing advice including managing debt, energy bills and benefits.

# Brave youngster with fear of heights abseils down the world's tallest vertical distillery

Fourteen-year-old Jessica Wallace from Livingston faced her fear of heights in May to fundraise for Children First after they supported her family through a difficult time.

The brave teen raised more than £700 in vital funds to protect Scotland's children by taking on her biggest charity challenge yet – abseiling more than 100ft down the Port of Leith Distillery.

Children First worked alongside Jessica's family when her nephew, Lucas, now nine, was placed into the care of Jessica's mum Alexandra when he was just 18 months old because his mum could no longer look after him. When Lucas was born, he faced serious health challenges and needed a lot of care and support. As he's grown, his learning disabilities have continued to shape his journey and the kind of support he needs to help him thrive.

Kinship carer Alexandra said: "We were faced with everything we could possibly be faced with. It was just so difficult for the family.

"The Children First West Lothian team visited us and they were just brilliant. They just came in, non-judgmental and asked 'What can I do to help you? What have you got, what do you need?

"Our worker helped us get a little cot bed for

Lucas which to this day he still talks about fondly. Children First were there as emotional support for me because I was absolutely traumatised."

Lucas has been in the care of his wider family since then and Alexandra says they are now "ticking along."

She added: "Jessica and I feel that it's our turn to pay back and add to the funds needed daily by the charity to help other children and families.

"When I saw the abseil challenge I thought -That's something Jessica could do."



At first, Jessica was apprehensive, but when she heard more about it, she was determined to raise money and started asking for sponsorship.

Alexandra said: "I am so proud of Jessica for overcoming her fears and completing the abseil, the weather was a bit windy, so it added to the tension. Jessica did so well and is a true star in my eyes." Jessica said: "I am so grateful that I did it for an amazing charity, but I might wait a while before I do it again!"

We can't thank Jessica enough for her incredible fundraising efforts.


# **SCOTTISH CHILDREN'S ONLINE HARM ADVICE**



to professionals goes global

New animations for social workers. teachers and police created by young people and Children First have been shared with audiences in America and Europe to inform international practice.

The animations were created by Erin and Jamieleigh, two young people who have both been personally affected by online harm, with support from Children First. The series of animations were developed in response to Children First research showing that children in Scotland feel that professionals don't know how to respond to online harm.



"We hope these animations will help professionals understand how to respond and the impact that online harm has on children's mental health."



Mary Glasgow, chief executive of Children First said: "The children we spoke to during the research talked about a range of issues from how intimidating it can feel to talk to a police officer to how stressful it can be to be pulled out of lessons without notice and with your class watching you.

"We are very grateful to Erin and Jamieleigh for sharing their experiences to help other children, not just in Scotland but across the world. We hope that professionals will find the animations a useful resource for considering how to better support children and young people and share them far and wide.

In addition to the animations for police, teachers and social workers. Jamieleigh and Erin have also created an animation to help parents and carers understand how they can keep children safe online.

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
